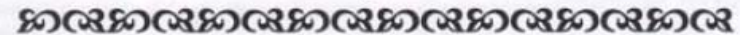

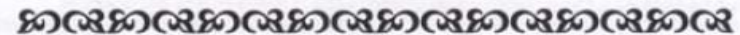

I am pleased to tell you that brewing is alive and well in the Kingdom of the West. Our ranks have been growing through a lot of hard work by many people: teachers, judges, brewers, and the interested members of the populace – but mostly through your individual efforts. Principality Guild Representatives have renewed the commitment to brewing in their areas and continue to encourage new brewers.

To further encourage more participation in brewing, we have extended the announced Kingdom competitions to appeal to a wide audience. No matter what type of brewing you are interested in, there is something to fit your interests. So gather your ingredients and start brewing!

To advance in the Guild ranking system you must perform works of service in addition to demonstrating competence in styles of brewing. What better way to perform service than to teach others to brew? Volunteer to teach at a Collegium, an A&S event, or better yet teach someone from your own local group how to brew. The Brewer's Guild has new one gallon jugs (like apple juice comes in) available for your classes. This way students can take some of the wort or must home to ferment. Jugs are \$0.50 each through the Chronicler (lids are a small amount more). Try offering an easy mead class where everyone takes home gallon of must! Plan ahead a little and your students can enter into upcoming contests.

Don't forget to bring some brew to share at crown events...

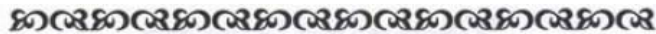

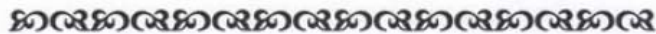
News From Cynagua

News From the Mists

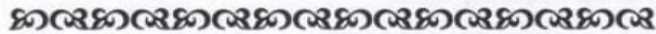
Our Mists Representative is George of Berwick.

Upcoming Classes!!!

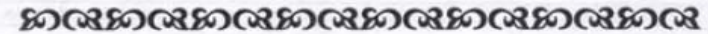
Time to look at your schedules and sign up to teach or take classes! If you are not ready to teach, then there will be great opportunities to be a student and learn more about brewing! Brewing classes will be taught at **Kingdom A&S, July 27-29**. So far we have classes in: Brewing Cyser, and Non-alcoholic Brews. Henry may also teach a class if the schedule allows.

For all those brave souls venturing to the **Pennsic War, August 4th through 19th**, there are usually many excellent brewing classes taught there. Henry will be teaching "Tasting the World of Beers", and co-teaching "The Brewing Marathon" - a full day of brewing featuring the Markham Mashing Technique, with his apprentice brother. Research Notes!

Crystal of the Westermark discovered an excellent on-line research source. It is called "**Patterweb**" and it consists of a search engine that has access to about twelve dictionaries from the late 1500's and early 1600's. The url is <http://www.chass.utoronto.ca/english/emed/patterweb.html>

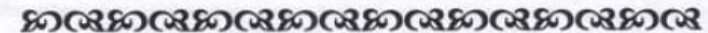
She writes "Here you can find such little treats as (first line is the author, year and name of the dictionary) :
Vigon Traheron (Vigon Traheron 1543 @ 4491261)
"Hydromel. Hydromel is methé made of water, and honye"

Vigon Traheron (Vigon Traheron 1543 @ 4511160)
"Oximell. Oxymel is made of vinaygre, and honye."

Apparently, they are less "dictionaries" in the modern sense; most of them seem to be english-to-french/spanish/latin books or word-of-the-day sources. Still, it looks like there might be some good stuff if you have time to search carefully.

For those who are looking for on-line sources for period recipes, **Medieval/Renaissance Brewing Homepage** has a very nice collection, including recipes from Digby and other period sources. Be aware that not all of the material on the site is period - check the dates before using this material as documentation. Some of the non-period materials may be very informative, and the recipes may produce a tasty brew, but they will NOT make appropriate documentation for a period brew.

This reminds me of a problem that judges often encounter when reading documentation. An entry makes use of a recipe from a book that was labeled "traditional". There are NO period attributions. What is the judge to do? Generally, the word traditional has no research value. A significant portion of the "traditions" in modern folk ways have developed during or since the Victorian era. This is not to discount all traditions, they may have a historical basis, but simply stating that something is traditional is NOT documentation. You need to find a period document, or inscription, a chemical analysis report, or some other hard fact that indicates the existence of a technique or ingredient.



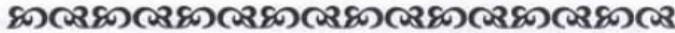

Brewers' Guild Ranking System

DEFINITIONS:

Style - beer, wine, mead, cordial, or non-alcoholic beverage.

Public Service Work - teaching a workshop, submitting articles or art to newsletters, holding a contest or tasting, etc.

Proficiency - competency in a style, as judged by fellow brewers from a sampling of at least four different brews.

RANKINGS:

Apprentice - Anyone who wants to play and participate in the Brewers' Guild activities. (Is entitled to wear the Guild badge on a green field.)

Journeyman - Someone who is proficient in at least one style of brewing and has performed at least one public service work. (Is entitled to wear the Guild badge on a blue field.)

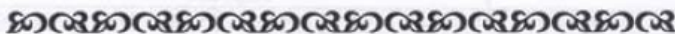
Craftsman - Someone who is proficient in at least two styles of brewing, and had performed at least three public service works. (Is entitled to wear the Guild badge on a red field.)

Master Brewer - To achieve this rank you must have attained the previous rank of Craftsman, be nominated by your fellow Craftsmen, and be approved by the other Master Brewers. (Is entitled to wear the Guild badge on a purple field.)

All members of the Guild are encouraged to donate bottles of their beverages to the Guild for use as "taxes" given to the reigning Royalty during court presentations. Brewers outside of the central Kingdom, or in the more distant regions of the Marches, may achieve awards up through Craftsman by participating in their local events. Such individuals should write to the Guild Master to inform him or her of their level of participation.

The Guild badge is as follows: "Fieldless, A tun palewise Or charged with a laurel leaf vert.". The tun, as generally depicted, is a wooden barrel.

The West Kingdom Brewer's Guild newsletter is an unofficial publication and is printed and published through donations. It is published at no cost to the Brewers' Guild or the SCA. Members who would like to have a newsletter mailed to their home are welcome to donate \$ 7.00 per year to the Guild Chronicler. Both stamps and suitable coins of the realm will be gleefully accepted! Some small number of newsletters will be available at Crown events. We would encourage all gentles who have email to accept their newsletter by that medium. E-newsletter subscriptions are free.
